Summer Session 1 June 25 - July 28, 2023

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SYLLABUS

Course Description

In this course students will become proficient in graphite, ink, and color media and acquire training in the essential skills needed to create accurate and informative natural history illustrations. This is a fast-paced course, particularly in the condensed Summer Session format.

Remote Instruction

This course will be hosted on <u>Canvas</u>. You do not need to sign up for an account, login with your CruzID and Gold Password at <u>canvas.ucsc.edu</u>. See <u>Canvas Getting Started Student Guide</u>." This class will be asynchronous. You will watch videos and look at presentations and examples for each module and work on the assignments on your own. I will give you feedback through Canvas, and encourage you to arrange a time to meet individually over Zoom if you would like to discuss anything in the course.

Submitting your work digitally

You will be submitting images of your assignments. A few tips for taking pictures: Lighting is key! Bright, but not glaring light please. Try to avoid shadows on the page. Bright, but diffused light from a window works well for me. If you have access to a scanner, that it great and very appreciated. Some phones have scanner apps on them that work really well too. PLEASE DO NOT SUBMIT "LIVE" PHOTOS (HEIC FILES). They don't open in Canvas.

Grading

There will be 9 modules (2 per week) and each module will be worth 100 points, except the final project which will be worth 200. In the normal academic year, this course is ten weeks, so the summer session modules are condensed. There are no art prerequisites for this course, so everyone comes into it at their own level. Some students are art majors and others have had little to no drawing experience. It is not a problem if you have not done much art in the past, you will make progress drawing a lot in the next weeks because you will be drawing and painting A LOT! I grade your assignments on the time you put in and engagement with the subject matter, not on what skill level you are at. You will find that the more you draw the better you get, especially if it is new to you. A steady and committed art practice is immensely rewarding, even if seems frustrating at times.

Because this class goes by so quickly, it is important to keep up. It is challenging for me to grade late work because it becomes out of sync with the class progress. I will deduct 10 points for work submitted late. Please let me know if you have problems keeping with the modules or have travel

issues that keep you from submitting on time. Many students do some assignments on camping and backpacking trips, which is wonderful and I encourage.

I encourage you all to do as much drawing and sketching outside, directly observing the natural world. For students who are located in Santa Cruz County, here is a list of places I like to go:

Seymour Marine Discovery Center and Santa Cruz Museum of Natural History are other great places to visit and sketch.

Module 6 Flower dissection botanical plate.

Module 7 Event Map (Optional maps and Cross-Sections)

Module 8 Species Interaction illustration

Module 9 Field guide page. An illustration of at least three related organisms.
