Course Information

In this course, you will learn aspects of recording through hands-on experience and the analysis of existing recordings. We will cover the fundamentals of microphone and console operation and recording techniques, mixing, and mastering. Students will be able to choose from a number of creative assignments to work on as their final project or propose their own.

Learning Outcomes

Students will develop a general understanding of the physical behavior of sound and learn how to identify and operate different types of microphones and recording equipment. Through their practical application in the studio, they will learn a variety of recording techniques and methods. At the end of the course, students will work on a final project, for which they must demonstrate their knowledge by developing an approach best suited to their own creative goals.

Required Materials

All course software can be accessed in the studio computers which will be available to students enrolled in this class. Participants may work on their own computers and use whichever DAW (Digital Audio Workstation) is available to them. For purposes of this course, we will be using **Reaper**, a free software which you can download from <https://www.reaper.fm/download.php>.

Grading Policy

Grading for this class will be based on a Complete/Incomplete criteria system. For every assignment, students will be required to submit a list of deliverables which will be outlined in the instructions. This will typically include a session file and a folder containing the audio files used in the session. If all files are uploaded, students will receive a Complete grade, otherwise the assignment will be graded as Incomplete.

Assignments will be due at the beginning of the next week, right before the start of class each Monday.

For all other purposes, the class will be focused on fostering conversation between all participants, facilitating a space for group learning where we can all provide useful feedback to our peers. Students will be encouraged to think creatively and explore different ways to realize their objectives.

Late Work

Because this is a summer class and there is only so much time available, it is highly encouraged that you manage your time wisely and aim to submit all work by the time it's due. Not submitting a week's work would hinder your progress in class. For these reasons, students will have until Wednesday at midnight to submit late assignments; a 5 percent penalty will be accumulated for each day past the due date. In the case of an extraordinary situation, students should get in contact with the instructor as soon as possible.

Recording Assignments

Each week, there will be a recording assignment following in-class exercises. For each of these assignments, the students will submit the following contained in a **google drive folder**:

- a) a session file
- b) a folder containing the audio files
- c) a rough mix of the recording as a bounced audio file
- d) a stage plot of the recording showing the positioning of the performers and the microphones
- e) an input list
- f) a short write up describing the type of ensemble or instrumentation that was recorded, the conditions under which the recording was done, how the instruments were positioned during the recording and why, and choice of microphones and reasoning behind these choices. Also included should be any challenges students might have faced during the recording and how these were overcome.

In order to facilitate class discussion and peer-to-peer feedback, assignments will be submitted via a forum, where students will post their **drive links** along with a **short description** of what they did.

Students should also **respond to at least two posts each week**, although commenting on as many posts as possible or desired is encouraged.

Weekly Forum

Each week, two students will individually post and lead a conversation about a topic recording related. This may involve a song, album, a Youtube video, an article, etc. The focus should be on approaches to recording, miking techniques, or something about gear. Students should include any information they know about the material, what they find interesting about it, things they might have learned, and/or any open questions they might want to bring up.

Students should **respond to at least two posts** for each forum. Those responsible to post on a particular week will only have to respond to **one other post**.

Final Project

For the final assignment, students will develop a recording project of their own. This project is meant to be creative and exploratory. Students are encouraged to apply the techniques learned in class as well as to experiment with original approaches.

The project may fall into any of the following categories: solo or group instrumental recording, voice acting, foley/sound design, or a combination of these. Students may suggest ideas not included in this list to be reviewed and approved by the instructor.

In addition to the session and audio files, students will need to submit an input list, stage plot, and a short write up, one or two pages long, describing the goals and realization of the project as well as any challenges they might have encountered and how they resolved them.

Final projects may be done individually or in groups, in which case a more substantial amount of work must be demonstrated.

Auxiliary Course Materials

Three main sources will be used as complementary material in this course. Tom Lubin's book *Getting Great Sounds: The Microphone Book* published by Cengage Learning, Peter Elsea's Technical Essay's from the UCSC's Electronic Music Studios [website](#) and sound engineer Ryan Earnhardt's educational videos from the *Creative Sound Lab* [YouTube Channel](#).
