Course Overview

Willkommen in Deutsch 3! German 3 is a third-quarter language course for students with two quarters of college German, or one year of high school German (or its equivalent). See me if you are in this course for any other reason so that the appropriate course for you can be determined.

We will meet via Zoom for live classes on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 10:40 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. In addition, you should, on average, plan to spend at least two hours of preparation for each class period studying German: completing online homework, reviewing grammar and vocabulary, reading and writing.

By the end of this course, you will be able to

- Understand and use a range of vocabulary appropriate to this level, including pronunciation skills
- Narrate in a variety of tenses, with special emphasis on the simple past tense
- Carry out basic speech acts appropriate to this level (i.e. saying how you feel, making a complaint)
- Read more complex authentic texts, get the main ideas of the story and most of the supporting ideas
- Write short texts and stories in German using more complex narrative frames, interesting details and discourse structures
- Explore cultural phenomena within the German-speaking countries (i.e. famous sightseeing locations, holidays)
- Present to the class on a topic relating to cultural phenomena

Required Texts and Materials

We will be using the free online language program for beginning students that is offered by *Deutsche Welle* (Level A2). You can access the program, *Nico's Weg* (A2), here: <u>https://learngerman.dw.com/en/overview</u>. Note: in lieu of a book and to cut down on screen time, you may want to print out our course grammar supplement, which can be found on our Canvas homepage (this is entirely optional).

Additionally, you will be using:

- Google Slides provided by the instructor and posted before we meet each day under Pages on Canvas (each session has its own page). I recommend printing out the slides ahead of time so you can refer to them during class.
- A binder or folder for the printed-out Google Slides.
- A notebook or loose-leaf paper for taking notes (or you can use the slides).
- An online dictionary. Two excellent choices are <u>www.leo.org</u> and <u>www.linguee.com</u>. NO GOOGLE TRANSLATE OR OTHER ONLINE TRANSLATORS!

Grading

All students in the course will be graded according to the following six criteria:

- 1. <u>Attendance and in-class participation = 20%</u> This includes your timely arrival to class and your level of engagement in our in-class activities, such as whole-class or group work. You will receive a daily score out of 5 points.
- 2. <u>Nico's Weg online homework = 15%</u> This includes your work from the assigned Nico's Weg video clips and exercises. The scores you earn online will be your scores for this category, and you will submit screenshots of your chapter progress to Canvas.
- 3. <u>Quizzes = 20%</u> These quizzes are given at the completion of every two chapters.
- 4. <u>Writing and reading assignments = 15%</u> A collection of tasks given throughout the term that reflect what we have been working on. You will receive a score out of 10 points for each task.
- 5. <u>Oral presentation = 10%</u> You will prepare and deliver to the class, in German, a short presentation on a topic related to a cultural phenomenon in Germany.
- 6. <u>Final exam = 20%</u> This comprehensive final exam covers the vocabulary, grammar, pragmatics and skills (reading, writing, listening) of German 3.

Regarding quizzes and the final exam:

• All 5 quizzes will be administered on Canvas and can be found under the Assignments tab. They will be available for 24 hours on the dates indicated on the weekly plan. While they are not timed, you will complete them on your own, in one sitting, without the use of online dictionaries, notes or other materials.

• The final exam will be a Google Doc that you enter your answers into and submit to Canvas on the last day of the course, **Friday**, **August 19th** (from 10:40-1:40 p.m.). You will complete the exam on your own without the use of online dictionaries, notes or other materials.

If you show up late for the final exam, you will still have to finish it at the same time as the other students. If you do not show up for the test without having obtained my permission beforehand, you will not receive any credit. Emergencies that can be substantiated to my satisfaction will be treated as exceptions.

Your Next Course

Once you finish German 3 with a grade of C or above, you are eligible to take German 4.

Attendance policies

This course is designed to help you build and practice new skills in German steadily and regularly. Your presence in class is especially important because of the rapid pace at which we cover and practice material and the fact that each session builds on the material of the previous session(s).

If you absolutely have to miss class for relevant reasons, please let me know as soon as possible beforehand. You may follow along using the Canvas page for that day, which includes the session's Google Slides, in-class activities, relevant links and homework. Once the lecture recording for each session is available, I will post it to the day's page.

If you have an unexcused absence, you will not only miss important information, but you will receive a 0 for your attendance and in-class participation score that day. In order to ensure a high-quality learning environment for each level of German, <u>if you miss more than 6 class periods you will not be allowed to continue to the next level of instruction</u>.

In case of serious illness, hospitalization, death in the family, or severe mental health or emotional problems, I will evaluate your situation on an individual basis. In order to receive exemptions for extensive absences, you must bring documentation from a doctor's office on official stationery stating the date and time of your appointment explicitly, as well as the duration of your illness.

Late work/Make-up work

The penalty for late homework is 2% per day/one whole grade (10%) after 5 days. These are challenging times for sure, and if you foresee problems with turning in your work on time, please let me know. I am happy to work with you to create a path forward.

If you must turn in late work, I will grade it and/or provide feedback as soon as possible, but please note that my priority is giving students a quick turnaround of work that is submitted in a timely manner.

Make-up work will be allowed in exceptional situations, such as during serious illness, observance of religious holidays, military service or family emergencies.

If class has to be cancelled, I (or the school) will notify you via Canvas in the morning. Due dates for assignments will automatically be moved and edited in Canvas under the assignment's posting. Please check Canvas daily **and** make sure you have your notifications on so that you are aware of any communication from me.
